Will Leipsic Viking Baseballers Hold Out in 1977?

Although high school sports are strictly amateur, it might be fun to imagine what would happen if interscholastic sports had the same problems as major league baseball.

Ted Miller has a depressing problem. Miller, the head coach of the 1976 Viking state championship baseball team is having trouble getting his players signed up for the upcoming season. It seems as if the players feel they are worth more than Miller and team owner, Lee Schmitt, wants to give them.
