We have a completely new set of champions in basketball in Putnam County, proud heroic athletes who have carried off the palm of victory and are wearing the laurels that the glory of the fifth annual county tournament has bestowed on the winners.

Leipsic Triumphs

Leipsic has come through. They are the undisputed county champions for 1928 and will represent the county at the District Meet at Lima next week. May they do as well there as they did in the local basket fracas of last week.

Every year since basketball has been tournamented at the Armory near the close of February, Leipsic has been a strong contender for first place, but never quite made the grade. There has always been a stumbling block of some kind and more than once that obstacle has been a plucky little team from the county seat.

But this year, by successive and decisive victories, they pounded their opposition to pulp and there was no stopping them in their onward march to the pinnacle of basketball fame. Most commentators give them a wide margin over any other team in the county.

Vaughnsville was the first victim of the champions, going down to defeat by a score of 26 to 17.

In the semi-finals Ottawa was downed in easy fashion to the tune of a 47 to 11 count.

In the final game Saturday evening, Columbus Grove was walloped; final score reading 39 to 14.

Good Tournament

It would be fitting and proper to go into detail on every game played during the five-session affair, but such a detailed report is not possible. Many payers on defeated teams deserve honorable mention by name. We wish we might do that very thing in these columns.

Putnam County has a group of young people that are a credit to its citizenship. Good sportsmanship prevailed through the tournament.
