

State Champs Win a Close One Shoots 63 Foul Shots – PCL Record

Continental News Review – November 16, 1950

Miller City, the 1950 Class B Ohio basketball champion, almost lost its first game in two years Friday night but managed to slip past a powerful Continental five, 58-56 in a wild whistle-blowing contest.

Exactly 100 free shots were given to both teams because of the vast number of personal fouls. Miller City shot 63 gift throws and made 28, while the home team shot 37 times and made 22. Continental lost three men at the beginning the fourth quarter.

Roy Meyer, the little 5'6" Miller shot maker, dumped in 29 points to top scoring. Dwight Etter, Continental forward, made 20. The B champs, led 20-15 at the first quarter mark and 33-27 at halftime, but fell behind at the end of the third period 45-39. A 19-point outbreak in the fourth stanza cemented the game for Miller City.

Continental travels to Sherwood on Tuesday. Miller City takes a two weeks rest before going to Hamler on November 24th.

Miller City won the reserve game 30-29, but Continental copped the junior high scrap, 27-19.
