The boys' long jump has been held in every PCL Track and Field Meet since 1920. This event was originally called the broad jump, but in the mid 1960s it started to be referred to as the long jump. The first jump and record was held by Harold Weaver of Leipsic when he jumped 16 feet, 11 1/2 inches in 1920. In 1923 Owen Lowe of Continental reset the record at 20 feet, 11 1/2 inches. A few years later, this record was mistakenly reported to be 21 feet, 11 1/2 inches. No one caught the mistake, and Lowe was credited with an extra foot on his leap for nearly 90 years. His record actually only lasted for 32 years until Larry Johnson of Leipsic jumped 21 feet, 4 inches in 1955. Johnson held the record for 54 years when Sam Spallinger of Pandora-Gilboa smashed it with a leap of 22 feet, 2 inches in 2009. Spallinger lengthened the record by a foot in 2010 when he jumped 23 feet, 2 inches.
