Pandora Wins Tourney Crawfis College Girls Lose Final Game on Technical Point Putnam County Sentinel – March 1, 1929

The Putnam County Basketball Tournament at the Armory last Friday and Saturday was the largest and most successful in the athletic history of the county. First honors went to the Pandora girls, the laurels of victory thus resting on a team from the south side of the county.

Pandora defeated Leipsic, Miller City and Crawfis to win the title and possession of the coveted cup. Nearly all games were won by close scores.

Two girl's games were fought to a standstill, resulting in a tie at the close of the playing period and were decided in favor of the team that made the most field goals.

Ottawa lost to Belmore by this method and Crawfis had to bow to Pandora in the same way in the final game on Saturday.

In the Friday evening session, Pandora shaded Leipsic 26 to 20 and then on Saturday, defeated Miller City 31 to 18.

The Crawfis girls followed suit by triumphing over the Columbus Grove girls in a 19 to 10 manner and then set down Belmore by the count of 43 to 13.

In the finals on Saturday, Pandora and Crawfis played to a 30 to 30 tie, but Pandora was declared the Putnam County champions since they made more field goals.

Referees were Slocum and Lehman of Toledo, who did their usual brand of good work. John Klein was the official time-keeper and Rev. March and Supt. B. I. Perry were official scorers. Supt. T. I. Curtiss of Ottawa was manager of the tournament.
