The potato sack race was held in the PCL Track and Field Meet from 1920-1928. Most of the winners were recognized, but the length of the race was never given. As a result the few times that were found were not useful. The details of this event were not given, but if rules of "today" were applied the race was simple. A participant would put both legs in a potato sack, hold the top of the bag with both hands and start jumping to the finish line. This race was retired in 1928.
